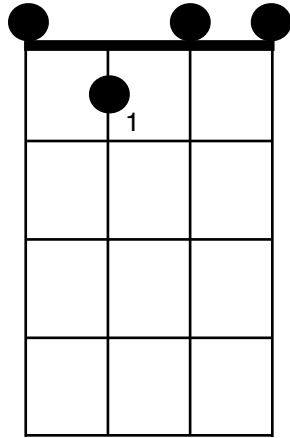


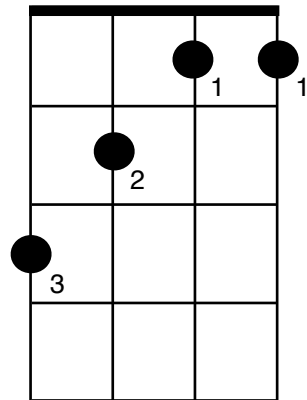
# Here Comes the Sun

## Bb

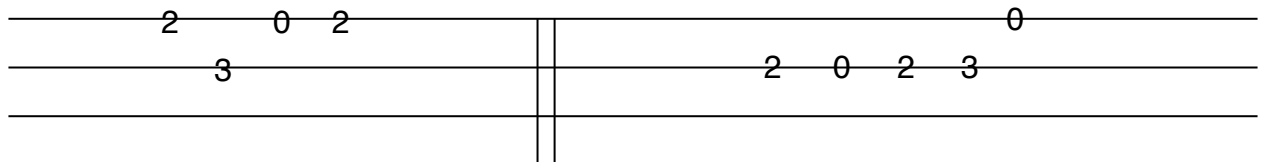


The Bb (B flat) chord is called a barre chord because a left hand finger plays more than one string. Flatten the 1st finger across both the 2nd and 1st strings.

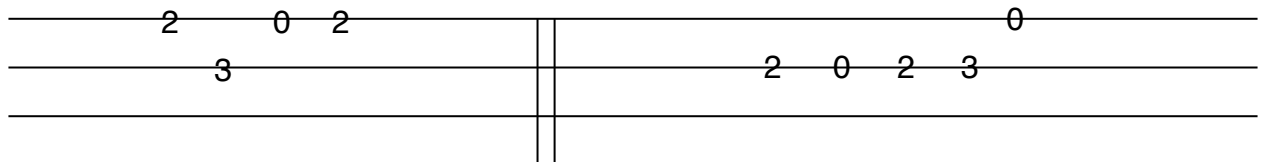
## Riffs

There are three basic riffs that are played at different places in the song.

### Strum Patterns

#### Verse
